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**Goal:** These exercises are intended to get a feel for Persistent Scatterer and Distributed Scatterer time series analysis results. Furthermore, the aim is to provide training in the interpretation of such results.

### Exercise 1, Discovering characteristics of PS/DS-InSAR products and interpreting data

**1a. Go to the Chongqing portal.**  
**(Depending on your location, you may need a VPN connection)**

- Sentinel-1 (“S1”) satellite ascending (“asc”) orbit
- Full time series of about 3.5 years

By right-clicking on the layer, information can be retrieved

**1c. Go to the Satelliet zettingsmetingen portal.  
(Depending on your location, you may need a VPN connection)**

**Answer the questions below.**

Note that there are four map layers for:

- TerraSAR-X (“TSX”) satellite ascending (“asc”) and descending (“dsc”) orbit
- **PS** and **DS** (Point- and Distributed Scatterers)
- **High** (Hoge) and **Low** (Lage) points
- Full time series of about 9 years, and 2 year time series (“2y” in the name).

By right-clicking on the layer, information can be retrieved
